




Key principles

Key Elements

- Bring together the Lancaster West Estate and wider community with public services providers and asset owners from RBKC, NHS, TfL (and others) to explore, innovate and co-design a neighbourhood services hub located across a campus of connected sites.
- Create a new sense of place, and a sustainable neighbourhood centre, where residents from the Estate itself and Notting Dale ward more widely can access the services and amenities.
- A creative and culturally inclusive approach to where services are delivered across a range of assets (for example delivering health offerings in currently under-capacity community centres)
- Bringing a grassroots strategic approach to maximising the use of various public assets, and seizing opportunity for new social homes in and around the estate
- Seizing opportunities to decarbonise public buildings on Lancaster West and beyond, to meet Council and government carbon reduction targets. For example, a BEIS funded feasibility study is in place to establish the first renewable-source district heating network in the borough.

One example - Building partnerships

- March 2021: LWRA, RBKC and NHS worked to offer a covid clinic in heart of estate
- Utilising council asset (North Kensington Resource Centre), which is managed by community LWRA
- 88 first Covid vaccinations provided in a single afternoon
