


Summary of findings from understand phase

Health and Wellbeing

Key findings

- Population mostly affected by respiratory diseases, heart diseases and cancer, as well as learning disabilities, epilepsy and obesity, especially in children.
- Life expectancy in this ward is 10 years less than the borough average.
- Historically, there have been a lack of health and wellbeing services in and around the Lancaster West Estate.



Education and Economic Development

Key findings

- only 31.7% of residents are full time employees, compared to 41% in the borough and 40% nationwide.
- careers in the built environment and green skills is an interest of residents on the Estate
- only 31.5% of residents have a level 4 (degree equivalent or above) qualification, in contrast to 52.7 % in the borough and 37.7% in London,
- 23.6% of the adult population have no qualifications at all.




Sustainability and a Green Estate

Key findings

• The ambition for the Estate is to become the UK's biggest eco-neighbourhood and become carbon neutral by 2030.

Key issues:

- **fuel poverty** (12.37% of residents in Kensington and Chelsea are at risk)
- heating of homes (5.5% of homes on Lancaster West are rated EPC D or below)
- high levels of air pollution
- deficiencies in access to nature in the Notting Dale ward.



Connected Communities

Key challenges:

- high levels of deprivation
- with poor/moderate public transport accessibility
- poor accessibility to retail, offices and green space.
- Safety



15 ideas presented to residents



Help define an educational journey, a service that maps the different learning and training opportunities and milestones in relation to an area of interest, for example the built environment or green skills, to help secure paid employment.

Support the creation of a job brokerage centre on the Estate, a service for residents to access

employment opportunities all in one place, structured to bring together all possible opportunities from different providers from the Estate and beyond.

Support the creation of a social enterprise model, a service which would enrich livelihoods by allowing residents to start their own businesses on the Estate and to create positive social change.

Support the creation of a ood ecosystem map, to provide equitable access to residents to food-related initiatives and schemes in the Estate and beyond.



offering and promoting Identify potential volunteering opportunities for residents. This could help alleviate social isolation and improve mental health. whilst building skills needed





underutilised spaces to further encourage physical activity - for example, physical trails to connect to services and green spaces in the broader area, or outdoor gyms and playgrounds.

Identify potential spaces on the Estate and surrounding area to accommodate mental health services, making best use of both indoor and outdoor opportunities - for example, a sensory garden, which is a space with features. surfaces, objects and plants that stimulate people's senses through touch, sight, scent, taste and hearing, and with that they contribute to physical and mental health & wellbeing.



Support ongoing activities to address fuel poverty by helping establish a fuel support service to help residents understand their energy usage and bills, and make changes in their homes to help save energy whilst remaining comfortable (cool in summer, warm in winter). By doing this, residents could save money and have more control over their energy use. It will also help to cut carbon and contribute to sustainability goals.





Identifying potential for circular economy initiatives - for example a repair shop or library of things where household items, appliances and tools can be borrowed or repaired within the community free of charge. This could help residents to save money and minimise waste by giving access to appliances without having to buy or store them, and helping people to fix items rather than replace them. Such services can also provide opportunities for volunteering and skills development, and bring residents together, helping to avoid social isolation and improve mental health.

Identify underutilised spaces that could be developed into communal green spaces, community gardens and food growing spaces to build on the already successful smallscale local community gardens that have been developed across the estate and bring people together over a shared passion for growing and nurturing herbs and plants. These will provide opportunities for skills development, learning about gardening and healthy eating and a space for community gatherings.



Identify potential on the Estate to create and expand on existing community spaces that can be owned, led and managed by residents and can provide activities for families, children and youth on the Estate.



women, the elderly, disabled Identify potential improvements and vulnerable communities to wayfinding and signage (for example by encouraging on the Estate to strengthen the Estate's identity and make it easier for residents to move around and find key locations (for example, nearby health and employment services).

Promote equitable access to services with the creation of a services map that will link residents with the range of health and employment services available at estate and ward level.

Ideas collected will be developed into a **Playbook** - a visual document to **inspire** us with examples of how these ideas have been achieved elsewhere.





Promotes inclusion and learning and social exchange and engagement, contributes to reducing social isolation.




